## Consistent care, convenience mark Eisele's stays

After Sharon Eisele had hip replacement surgery Sept. 12, she knew Lancaster Rehabilitation Center was the obvious choice for her rehabilitation needs.

Eisele's daughter, Denise Eisele Orick, said this is her mother's third stay at Lancaster Rehab. They returned because of the quality care and proximity to where Orick lives and works.

"It felt like going back home because we've been there before," Orick said. "We've always had good experiences with Lancaster Rehab. I like that Lancaster Rehab's team communicates well, and the nurses are accommodating. They take time to explain my mom's situation."

Eisele has been working on balance and hip strength twice a day with Physical Therapist Rikki Lay. She also works with Occupational Therapist Matt Buescher once a day to complete daily tasks such as putting on socks and shoes with a reacher and walk aid. Though therapy is challenging sometimes, Eisele is confident the exercises will help her return to independent living in her apartment.

"I'm thankful I'm getting stronger," she said. "Everyone at Lancaster Rehab has been nice and helpful. My children are a big help to me, too."

Eisele's three children, Denise, Dave and Nicole, take turns caring for their mother now that she's 84. They all live in Lincoln, where Eisele made her career as beautician at Miller & Paine department store.

Orick said she's so pleased with the level of care her mother has received at Lancaster Rehab that she wouldn't hesitate to recommend the skilled nursing facility to others.

"If Mom would need long-term care down the road, I would really like to see her live at Lancaster Rehab," she said. "It's consistent and convenient for our family. I also know others who have had family there and like it."

## Fish achieves 30 years in health care

If there's one thing Administrator Amy Fish's experience in health care has taught her, it's that the industry is built on human connection.

"It's all about relationships with our residents, our patients, our team, our family members and our providers," she said. "Being able to relate to people is crucial to hiring the best people, training great leaders and caring for our clients."

This idea remains a central motivation to Fish as she celebrated three decades in health care administration Oct. 31. She honed her skills in four facilities in Nebraska and Arizona, including a small rural hospital, a 110bed Alzheimer's facility and a 200bed dual licensed, newly constructed campus.

By the time Fish joined Lancaster Rehabilitation Center, Nebraska's largest skilled nursing facility, in July 2014, she was primed to lead the team

to implement an annual strategic plan.

Since then, Lancaster Rehab has become a five-star rated facility by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid, earned the American Health Care Association Bronze Quality Award and averages 94 percent on customer satisfaction scores.

"Not only do we feel we're providing excellent care — our customers say so too," Fish said. "Our success belongs to everyone because every person played a piece in getting us here. Let's continually ask how we can raise the bar."

The Council Bluffs, Iowa, native also credits strong family support in being able to reach this career milestone. Her husband, Bob, and two daughters, Ashlee and Annie, have stood by her as the industry evolves.

"Our elderly population is growing, and we'll keep pursuing the opportunities to better serve this group," Fish said.

For Fish, being a leader also means giving back to the community. She is an active member of the Department of Health and Human Services Nursing Home Administrator Board, North Lincoln Business Association and the Nebraska Health Care Association. She is also a licensed preceptor for the State of Nebraska, and she is active on the National Administrator Board.

#### What do most people not know about you?



### Diers celebrates 46 years

As she celebrates 46 years of service, Medical Records Assistant Barb Diers is most proud of the personal connections she's built with people of different backgrounds at Lancaster Rehabilitation Center.

"I'll never forget all the friends who I've made among co-workers, residents and families," she said. "I've been glad to keep our patients and residents comfortable and make sure their stay is a happy one."

Originally from West Union, Iowa, Diers had lived in Lincoln since she was 1. She started her career with the skilled nursing facility Aug. 23, 1972, when Lancaster County purchased the former Saint Elizabeth's hospital. She started as nursing assistant, and soon became medication aide in 1974. In 1992, she became what was then called a ward clerk.

Back then ward clerks took physician orders, transcribed them to medication sheets, and assisted nurses. Through digitization of information

today, Diers still employs extraordinary organization to handle copious medical records: admissions charts, summaries and data input, reports and discharge forms.

"My job is to make sure we have all

the documents we need to give our residents and patients the best care," she said. "I also help nursing staff with reports, orders and questions — anything that will help them serve our clients."

Diers plans ahead for the facility's patients and residents. She schedules 30-day, 60-day and yearly visits from primary care physicians and nurse practitioners who come to the facility. She arranges twice monthly visits from a vision service and podiatrist. She also works with Transportation to coordinate off-site appointments.

Working with others has always been her favorite part of the job. The people at Lancaster Rehab are family, Diers said, in addition to her significant other of 30 years, Ted, and cats, Calli and Willi.

"I encourage employees to treat our patients and residents as if they were your own mother, father, sister, brother," she said. "Spend some time and get to know them. They're full of history; I've learned so much from them."
